Design and Development of Destination Crenshaw Embraces Community Involvement

Destination Crenshaw is shaping up to be the nation's largest outdoor art and cultural celebration of Black contributions. The highly anticipated reparative development project continues to collaborate with local leaders and talented professionals to ensure input from the community is valued and embraced from ideation to completion.

L.A. City Council President Pro Tempore Marqueece Harris-Dawson joined Gabrielle Bullock,

Global Diversity at Perkins & Will; and Dr. V. Joy Simmons, Destination Crenshaw senior art and exhibition advisor for an in-depth conversation discussing the future 1.3-mile public art open-air museum.

The project will transform Crenshaw Boulevard from an area that has long deserved economic investment and strategic urban planning into a thriving commercial corridor, linked by architecturally stunning community spaces and pocket parks with hundreds of newly planted trees.

"We believe strongly, as community organizer principal and director of people will always oppose African American History

"We hit the streets in a big way, knocked on more than a thousand doors. We took almost 500 surveys, talked, convened with business owners, faith leaders and connected with people who are engaged in the conversation and can participate in the project."

Also, the architectural firm Perkins and Will, which is also known for its design of the Smithsonian National Museum of

and Culture in Washington DC, has a profound history of creating spaces that tell the stories of communities.

Residents in attendance and those tuned in online were introduced to the curatorial process for incoming sculptures, murals, and architecture through video presentations along with renderings displayed throughout the event space.

The theme of the program posed a question: "How do you grow a rose from concrete?" inspired from the poem by Tupac Shakur. The poem is a



Fathers and Mothers Who Care, a nonprofit organization, held an open house and ribbon cutting ceremony on May 4. A large turnout of friends, family, and political leaders came out to see the hard work and dedication that went into opening the facility at 515 East Rosecrans in Compton.

According to the group's website, the organization helps tackle the causes of poverty by assisting homeless youth and veterans facing a wide range of challenges including employment, education, health, and mental illness. The organization's services are available to anyone who visits their location.

"What I wanted the

Compton community to know about our organization is that we have been serving the community for 26 years. I am a veteran and wanted to help other veterans. Anyone who wishes to donate by assisting us with their talent, we would love to have them," said Argyle L. Prevost, Sr., vice president of Fathers and Mothers Who Care.

"In our community, there are a lot of pop-up health clinics where we have people that are community members [who they] cannot even understand. These same clinics are not geared towards our culture. We wanted to combat disparities in our community and have quality of service," said

Shannon D. Jones, communications manager of Fathers and Mothers Who Care.

Jones gave the Sentinel a tour of the facilities. One of the buildings had items for the homeless such as clothing, towels, Depends, children's diapers, personal hygiene, shoes, and more. Another building provided a room to conduct case management for veterans and space for the telecommunications training. Tony Jenkins, instructor for the telecommunications course, has been in the field since 1978.

"I taught for the Los Angeles Unified School District for seven years, but the program got shut down. There is a great need for the course because it allows people all over the universe to converse by telephone,

text message, emails and fax machines," said Jenkins.

"We received donations for the books and tools that the students will need," he added.

"The telecommunications course is a 14-week course through the Department of Labor," said Jones, who credited Rising Communities organization with awarding a grant for the course to Fathers and Mothers Who Care.

"Some of our sponsors include Blacks in Motions, City of Compton, Community Garden, and Pucker Up Lemonade Company," Jones said.

A Great Day in South L.A. Offers Black History Tours

"A Great Day in South LA," which is an immersive three-hour Black History tour that explores iconic landmarks such as Crenshaw/Baldwin, Leimert Park, Hyde Park, View Park, West Adams Historic Central and Avenue.

Owned and operated by Janae Green, the tours occur every Saturday at 10 a.m. and 2 p.m. The mission is to enlighten, inspire, offer a deeper understanding of African American culture, while honoring the staples of the South L.A. community.

Green has called Los Angeles home for the past 10 years after moving from her hometown on the Southside of Chicago. She always knew she would end up in Los Angeles, calling it the "hub of entertainment." She wanted to

get involved in some capacity, but she desired to find out.

"I eventually came here to finish my Master's degree - Masters of Entertainment Industry Management from Carnegie Mellon University," she stated. "Once I graduated, I started interning with NBC Universal and HBO, and eventually landed a role at HBO."

The inspiration behind Green's launch of the tour business was because she is a hobby historian. Outside of her business, she is a film producer, writer and researcher whose primary job is in the film and tech industry as a producer and program manager.

"Even though I wear a number of hats, they all point back to my love of Black history. Being a grandchild of people who migrated to Chicago during the Great Migration in the 1940s, this history is personal; and after having done tours now, I'm intrigued at how people seemed to light up when they get new information about the NAACP (yes, it was new information for a few riders), Golden State Mutual, Biddy Mason, etc.," she highlighted.

A Great Day in South LA was launched in March 2024, so far, has done a mix of small and large group rides. Green is the guide and does historical storytelling on the tour, informing participants about notable Black influences, places, and events.

Her passenger van fits up to 12 guests and rides through Los Angeles streets giving various facts about famous people and

There is also a snack stop at the 27th Street Bakery for guests to purchase baked goods. So far, Janae has had guests in groups of 2, 5, and 11.

"I've noticed that it's a great bonding experience for everyone and I hope to keep up that momentum," she said. "We are just starting off, so it's been a slow and steady kind of day with all of this."

Green calls South L.A. her home now, so she is personally invested in highlighting the many local historical gems. What she loves most is seeing her "explorers" - what she calls her guests - as they light up at the new information they heard.

"One explorer asked me what the NAACP was when we talked about the

learned about Biddy Mason for the first time and her path from enslaved to real estate mogul as we rode through Sugar Hill (West Adams)."

Green continued with her proud moments and memorable highlights of the tour also stating that someone visiting from the Bay Area whispered to her that the tour made her feel proud to be Black. These are all moments that enforce her "why" making her feel very honored that she is able to tell these historical stories. She also said that revelations not only happen for her guests on the tour, but also for herself.

"Yes, please tell me more about how you would get in that long line for a late-night hamburger at the original Fatburger stand on Western," she stated.

"It is what inspires me to keep telling these stories over and over again in hopes that the information continues to reach new learners and audiences and won't get lost with time."

Her goal was and still is to continue her role as a producer. Also, she has worked on set in various capacities including production assistant, production coordinator, and sustainability coordinator. She desires to lean into being an independent producer creating work that resonates with her "get it done" spirit as a creative and storyteller.

it's nice that we are building a body of work ready for when a studio is ready to write a check," she said.

Green keeps herself busy and has recently wrote a book, "Pages from the Green Book," which is a fiction she is still shopping to agents. She is currently working on her next book, a historical nonfiction, about Black influences in the 63 national parks. "Being a producer is project-based, so I can take time off here and there to go shoot a film. Mostly everything that I currently have on my plate is in development (meaning that we have to perfect the scripts, pitch them, raise funds, find crew, and shoot). I have three feature films and three shorts in this pipeline which are all at various stages.

"We are still an independent team of writers, directors, and producers, but Film Festival this year, of which she is very proud.

There is always something new for everyone to learn about the city of Los Angeles and Green wants to ensure that the untold stories aren't forgotten and we are all educated about it.

"I have been coming out for a while and I see firsthand how the beautification affects the people in Compton," he said as he scraped a gate that would later be painted.

Michael Buccowich, who serves on the Compton Initiative board and works with the Capital Group, also volunteered for the clean-up.

"In 1980-1981, the city of Paramount was declared an urban disaster zone. The **Looking Good Community** Restoration Program provided the materials and volunteers rehabilitated the city. Several years later, Paramount was named an All-American City," said

Buccowich. "I grew up in Paramount and wanted to help the people of Compton, and wanted to help the city see change," he said.

Third Generation Hair Care Empire Sustains through Mother-Daughter Succession


Autumn Yarbrough was just 10-years-old when she joined the family business as a third generation beauty heiress. Before social media influencers began sharing cosmetic secrets online, she modeled the Just for Me brand and products serving as an inspiration for Black American girls throughout the nation.

Her grandfather founded Pro-Line, Inc. and made hair care products for iconic styles in Black culture, like the Jheri curl, accessible for all. 

Graduating Cal State LA Student Achieves College Goals at Age of 71

At 71 years old, Marshall Mitchell will earn his Bachelor of Science in Business Administration with an option in management next week from Cal State LA's College of Business and Economics.

Mitchell, a Vietnam War veteran, paraphrased an old Army recruiting campaign slogan when explaining why it was important for him to continue his higher education goals at a time when most

people his age are already years into their retirement.

"You want to be all that you can be," he said. "Just like in the Army."

He cited other reasons as well. Mitchell said he promised his late mother, Ruthie Mae Washington, and five siblings years ago that he would complete his studies, and he also wants to serve as inspiration to his five grandchildren.

But Mitchell's degree will not serve just as a wall decoration at the Ontario home, nor just as a mere symbol of his determined "all that you can be" attitude. Mitchell-who has not worked for nearly two years because of an unprovoked, racially-motivated attack in October 2022intends to use the degree to help him find a job in man-

agement.

"I have no plans to retire," he said.

Not only that, but Mitchell is also determined to attend graduate school.

The Texas native joined the Army toward the end of the Vietnam War in 1975. His service to the country would last 35 years, and following his initial stint as a soldier, would also include time with the Navy, Marines, and Army Reserve.

He spent a large part of his military service as an office clerk, which cultivated his interest in management and human resources, and eventually led to his decision to major

in business management. After his discharge, Mitchell moved to Northern California to take care of his ailing father. It was there where he began his

academic career, earning Associate of Arts degrees from Laney College in Oakland and the City College of San Francisco, the latter of which led to a career in information technology.

Mitchell moved about four years ago to Southern California, where he obtained an associate degree in business administration from Fullerton College. He transferred to Cal State LA in January

As if Mitchell did not face enough challenges as an older undergraduate student, he was dealt a setback in October 2022 when he was brutally attacked by three men while working as a security guard in Monterey Park.

T. Fox, director of Student Success and Advising for the College of Business and Economics, praised Mitchell's resiliency.

"After facing so much adversity, Marshall could have easily given up on his goal of obtaining a bachelor's degree," Fox said. "He had to learn to adjust to a new educational environment as a non-traditional student. He could have dropped out of school [after the attack]." Mitchell said it took

him a year to fully recover.

Said Fox, "Angela Duckworth defines grit as 'a personality trait possessed by individuals who demonstrate passion and perseverance toward a goal despite being confronted by significant obstacles and distractions.' This definition accurately describes Marshall Mitchell."

Haji Malcolm and the Meaning of Manhood: Some Essential Moral and Social Conceptions

Continuing to uplift the life and liberating model and mirror Nana Haii Malcolm offers us in this the month of his coming-into-being, I want to draw again from ideas and excerpts from my coming major work, "The Liberation Ethics of Haii Malcolm X. Consciousness. Critical Moral Grounding and Transformative Struggle."

I want to focus on the issue of manhood, a central concern in his life, thought and liberating practice. Clearly, one of the major points of departure for critically discussing and discerning Haji Malcolm's understanding and engagement with the issue of manhood and Black people's conception of his manhood is the descriptions by the activistactor, Nana Ossie Davis, of Haji Malcolm and his manhood in both his eulogy for Haji Malcolm and his subsequent statement explaining why he eulogized him.

His definition of Haii Malcolm, as "our own Black shining Prince" and "our living Black manhood," and Black people's embrace of this concept, have inspired and informed a central part of the discourse around the meaning of manhood for Haji Malcolm. It also speaks to what it should mean for Black men and Black people as a whole and how it translates into Haji Malcolm's and Black men's concepts of and relations with Black women. This is a critical concern, especially as it is discussed in the context of Haji Malcolm's liberation, ethical thought and practice, his changed concept of men and women and their relations of respect with equal rights and reciprocity.

Haji Malcolm's concept of manhood is both experientially derived, culturally and ethically grounded and affirmed. Given the complexity of his thought and life, I want to focus on his conception in relation to the struggle and the oppressor. Nana Ossie's discussion helps to facilitate this mode engagement.

We can easily concede that his early views of manhood in

relation to womanhood was injurious, unjust and flawed, which he himself conceded and had begun to change. Although this has been widely written on, little or no critical discussion has been offered for the possible or real positives in Haji Malcolm's concerns about manhood, especially in relationship to the contrast and confrontation with the oppressor or the meaning of Nana Ossie Davis's statement on Haji Malcolm's manhood to the masses. My considered assumption is that it would be of value to explore these issues and I'd like to engage them here.

When Nana Ossie Davis, in his eulogy for Haji Malcolm, calls him "a Prince our own Black shining Prince! – who didn't hesitate to die for us, because he loved us so," he is speaking not of a hereditary political status derived from a royal sovereign. Rather, he is using an honorific, a praise name, to indicate Malcolm's earned and elevated status of profound respect, based on his people's assessment of his commitment, character and conduct in righteous struggle and self-sacrificing service to them and the world.

It is, above all, a moral evaluation and naming, and parallels and intersects with Nana Marcus Garvey's teaching on an aristocracy, not based on hereditary claims or membership in a power elite. On the contrary, Nana Garvey states that in the redemption and liberation of Africa, an aristocracy will be developed not of "privileged positions to inflict on the race" and "at the expense of the masses."

Moreover, this concept of royalty is also, in both NOI Muslim and Black Liberation Movement discourse of king and queen, an important way conferring respect, expressing, and demonstrating a valuing of one another. Like the use of the terms "brother" and "sister" in the thickest sense, it carries a moral category of appreciation and solidarity of a people rising up from degradation by the oppressor.

Thus, men and women are addressed and referred to as kings and queens, princesses and princes to suggest a variety of respect-

showing appellations such as: royal, honored and honorable, aristocratic and dignified, noble, worthy and elevated - in both a moral and social sense in Muslim, Garveyite and general Black Freedom Movement discourse. And finally, in Muslim and Movement discourse, royalty references speak to historical and genealogical claim that African descendant peoples are descendants of kings and queens in a literal, moral and social sense.

It was/is a claim, not only to counteract the deculturalization and inferiorization process of the Holocaust of enslavement and subsequent similar oppression, to reaffirm African humanity, worthiness, their human excellence and achievement in human history.

In Haji Malcolm's lectures on Black history and elsewhere, such references to kings, queens, royal and noble persons are not only used in both a historical/genealogical sense to indicate the roots of Black people, but also to indicate a high level of social and moral achievement. It also becomes, in its most moral and memory-honoring sense, a call and challenge to measure up in practice to be worthy of a royal and noble sta-

Thus, Nana Ossie Davis is not talking without an inherited historical and cultural script and precedence, but is drawing from and building on a long history and modes of cultural reaffirmation and resistance in using the honorific title and praise name, "a Prince, our own Black shining Prince! who didn't hesitate to die for us, because he loved us so."

There are at least three ways we can understand and appreciate Nana Ossie's assertion that "Malcolm was our manhood, our living, Black manhood. This was the meaning of his people. And in honoring him, we honor the best in ourselves."

The first meaning is that Haji Malcolm modeled and represented Black manhood at its best in its various positive understandings, i.e., as a provider, protector, a morally and spiritually grounded family man, committed to our liberation, uncompromising, witness and warrior for his people, and courageous and fierce in the face of the enemy without backing down. Here we can argue over the meaning of these attributes, but Nana Ossie would clearly support this reading, as well as many oth-

Secondly, since Nana Ossie said, "our living Black manhood," that "this was his meaning to his people" and that "in honoring him, we honor the best in ourselves," he seems also to be using it ["Black manhood"] as a metaphor for Black personhood and Black peoplehood. For these virtues and character traits attributed to Haji Malcolm and other men like him can be and are attributed to Black women and Black people as a whole.

As a progressive activistactor, this in his relationship with his equally progressive and activist actor wife, Nana Ruby Dee, Nana Ossie offers us ground to assume a wider meaning for manhood here than "maleness," isolated, unlinked and committed to a patriarchal, sexist and limited concept of the categories "man" and "manhood." Indeed, he could not possibly mean, either morally or rationally, that what men and boys offer women and girls at their best is their physical maleness as manliness.

Thirdly, it is Haji Malcolm's humanity, his respect,

inspiring courage, commitment, self-determination, defiant resistance, and other virtues that define him and which women and men, girls and boys can aspire to achieve. It is also an unapologetic particularized appreciation of the unique and equally valid and valuable way of his and his people's being human in the world, i.e., African, Black man or woman

Indeed, Haji Malcolm is posed as the model of Black personhood and Black peoplehood, as well as our humanity which Haji Malcolm himself calls for in his liberation ethics. That is one who woke up, cleaned up and defiantly stood up. In other words, he possessed critical consciousness, was morally grounded and was engaged in an ongoing righteous and radically transformative striving and struggle for a new and 'nother rightful way of Black man or woman and human in the world.

The Impact of VOCA Budget Cuts on Jenesse Center, Survivors of Domestic Violence, and the Community

For more than four decades, Jenesse has been a cornerstone of hope and support for survivors of domestic violence, particularly within the underserved communities of South Los Angeles. Founded by five Black women 43 years ago, our organization has provided comprehensive, culturally specific programs including shelter, counseling, direct legal assistance, permanent housing support, workforce development, and healthcare advocacy to more than 1300 survivors each year.

The recent announcement of anticipated cuts to the federal Victims of Crime Act (VOCA) fund has sent shockwaves through agencies like Jenesse Center, prompting immediate concerns about the future of vital services for survivors of crime.

"We are deeply appreciative of Senator Laphonza Butler's visit to Jenesse Center, where she gained a comprehensive understanding of our programs and the potential impact of the VOCA cuts. We are also thankful for Congressmember Sydney Kamlager-Dove, who took the time to engage with our team and learn about the challenges and opportunities we face."

Recently, a group of legislators signed a letter in support of AB 1956, designed to provide \$200M in ongoing funding to prevent VOCA cuts from impacting California programs in such a devastating fashion. Spearheaded by Assemblymember Eloise Gomez and signed by other assembly members, including Assemblymembers Tina McKinnor, Isaac Bryan, and Mike Gipson, this letter underscores the urgent need for sustained funding to protect vital services for survivors of crime.

As stated in the letter, the possibility of layoffs becomes an unavoidable reality for agencies affected by these funding reductions. However, for many, this isn't just a future risk—it's a pres-



Political Strategist Peggy Moore and Wife Hope Wood Killed in Fatal Car Crash

By Danny J. Bakewell, Jr. Executive Editor

Longtime political operative Peggy Moore and her wife, Hope Wood, died Friday, May 10 in a car crash at Pala Rd., just east of Horse Ranch Creek Road in San Diego County. The head-on collision, which occurred around 11 p.m., left four people dead and a fifth person was reported to have survived and transported to a local hospital in serious condition.

Moore and Wood met while working on President Barack Obama's campaign in 2008 and then went on to open the political consulting

firm Hope Action For Change in 2019. Moore worked as a special projects manager for former Oakland Mayor Libby Schaaf and more recently worked on Councilwoman Heather Hutt's Los Angeles City Council reelection campaign.

In a social media post California Congresswoman and former California Senate candidate Rep. Barbara Lee said, "I'm heartbroken to hear of the tragic loss of Peggy Moore and Hope Wood. Peggy was a friend, an activist, and one of the best organizers I knew. Her passion and fight for justice and equality is what brought her and Hope together.

"Together they organized, changed hearts and minds, and helped to create a world where who you love doesn't limit your freedom," Lee added.

"Both Peggy and Hope made an impact on our community, on our city, on our state, and on our nation that will be felt for generations to come."

A news release from the California Highway Patrol said the driver of a silver Chrysler 300 in the eastbound lanes of state Route 76 swerved into the westbound lanes and collided head-on with a white Jeep Gladiator. A Toyota Camry, which was driving behind

the Jeep, was also damaged. The cause of the crash is under investigation.

The Hope Action For Change website said the loving couple "created their consulting firm utilizing equitycentered design processes, identifying opportunities for both individual and organizational growth and employing a compassionate approach that engages the most marginalized voices to build a culture of resiliency, cohesion and success."

Moore, 60, and Wood, 48, were committed to causes aimed at empowering other women of color and protecting the rights of same-sex couples.

When Brown was elected to be the Speaker of the Assembly, he appointed Moore as the Chairperson of the Assembly Committee on Utilities and Commerce. The position held legislative jurisdiction over telecommunications, electricity, private water corporations, natural gas, and other issues related to exchanging goods and services between business-

Moore passed away in August 2020.

"Her job was done in such a way that when she left the halls of legislation in 1994 the public utility world reached out to get her guidance and judgment in the process of decisions that would be made," Brown said. "That's the nature of how we need to work in the world of politics and, how we need to exercise authority and privilege."



metaphor for resilience and determination. It compares the cracked concrete of an urban environment to the challenges faced by marginalized individuals. The rose represents hope and beauty emerging from adversity, defying limitations, and societal expecta-

Initially, the plan for a new Metro line called for the train to cut through the heart of South Los Angeles without stopping at its most notable cultural and economic hub. Historically, infrastructure projects in Los Angeles have ruined urban neighborhoods without taking local input into account. In 1963, the I-10 highway tore through the area and in 2011, the city chopped down 119 trees to make a path for the space shuttle Endeavour.

Destination Crenshaw produced the event with Zócalo Public Square which noted the proactive response of local voices for inclusivity regarding the Metro K Line. Area leaders convinced the city not only to add a Metro stop in their community, but to leverage its construction into the creation.

When complete, Destination Crenshaw will be home to artworks by Los Angeles artists like Charles Dickson, Maren Hassinger, Alison Saar, and Kehinde Wiley. Its architecture, streetscapes, and landscape designs are firmly rooted in Black identity, from native giant star grass to

Sankofa Park's namesake bird, which represents the need to look to the past to build the future.

The project is commissioning more than 100 Black Los Angeles artists of various media, including illustration, performance, and culturally stamped infrastructure for permanent and temporary installations in the corridor. As California's largest Black artists jobs program, the value of this program will provide additional access to resources, mentorship, and professional development opportunities for participating artists creating a pipeline of work for

emerging, seasoned and internationally renowned artists.

Gabrielle Bullock, an award-winning architect for Perkins and Will's Los Angeles office, is regularly sought out around the world for her leadership and expertise in issues of social and racial equity in architecture. Aside from project design, she also oversees Perkins and Will's Diversity, Inclusion, and Engagement program, which works to support and strengthen a firmwide culture that embraces diversity of people, colors, creeds, credos, talents, thoughts, and ideas.

"The two zip codes of Destination Crenshaw is 90008 and 90043. There is \$323 million of gross revenue in our creative economy currently happening today. We are making sure there's a permanent place to be able to access and grow that in our community," Foster said.

"We're going to be the first stop on the train once it's connected to the airport. The opportunity for us to take advantage of that and showcase who we are is what will really make a difference." He also pointed to union jobs and higher wages as a benefit along with an increase in property and land value.

The event concluded with Q&A from in-person guests and through an online chat. Many felt a sigh of relief when Harris-Dawson guaranteed the spirit of Nipsey Hussle, who named the master plan, would be recognized for his legacy by continuous communication with his surviving family mem-

Destination Crenshaw is expected to be completed Fall 2024. The first of the murals will be displayed in May with more art installations slated throughout the summer. Permanent art has been installed and the public gathering spaces are completed.

Adopting a Wellness Mindset: Kidney Conversations with Dr. Vincent Anthony - Part 3

LAS: How does one discover whether or not he or she has chronic kidney disease?

DVA: When you talk about chronic kidney disease, there are 5 stages. What chronic means is that I've measured your creatinine 2-3 times over at least three months, and it's remained stable. Two to three times of a GFR measurement over about 3 months; if it's stable, that's "chronic."

LAS: Due to the antibias efforts of the task force led by the National Kidnev **Foundation** (NKF) and the American Society of Nephrology (ASN), the algorithm used to calculate GFR has been adjusted so that now there is no separate calculation for Black people. What effects will this have?

DVA: The fact that it's being removed is a good thing on one side: Black people don't have access to transplants. What that calculation did is change when someone would be referred for transplant. [Overall], if our GFRs were calculated higher, that would mean we'd wait

longer to get intervention.

Now, there will be an expansion of those who are labeled with kidney disease because there's no racial calculation that puts us out of certain kidney disease categories, but we don't really have a great infrastructure to manage what we've got right now because people are waiting too late to get referred. And those who do have chronic kidney disease are not following it up enough to reverse things, so that's where the infrastructure

If we don't have a supply of nephrologists who are culturally relevant, then we're going to have a problem, because the pool is going to expand. The operational landscape of those taking care of kidney patients needs to be broadened to include cultural relevance.

[We must start] recognizing that less than 4% of all kidney specialists are Black, and that's a shortage. We already have a shortage of kidney specialists, in general, but then think about the fact that only 4% are Black and the number of Blacks going to medical school is dwindling.

LAS: What are fac-

tors that make the greatest difference in determining whether or not a person with Stage 2, 3 or 4 CKD will wind up going on dialysis?

When we say someone has stage 1 or 2, even if we call it stage 2, the statistics tell us that there is an increased risk of further progression, so it needs to be followed

So, seeing a nephrologist earlier has always been the clinical mantra. The problem is, it seemingly doesn't make financial sense because people look at a quarterly result, rather than the result over five years, in terms of finances. Again, that's something that, in building these companies, we're trying to change.

That's number one. Number 2 is parameters such as making sure the patient's blood pressure is absolutely controlled, making sure that they're consuming a diet full of antioxidants, increasing certain types of supplements that help the antioxidant properties along in slowing that overall progression of kidney disease. And the minute that I see a little bit of protein in the urine or change in their blood sugar, blood

pressure, or cholesterol, I'm all over that [to] slow the progression of kidney dis-

community health centers.

There are rarer things that go with that, which we do in the nephrology office, but those are the keys that people can do for themselves. Once you realize that the GFR is down, it doesn't mean it has to go fast. My goal is to have people with functioning kidneys live a normal lifespan with functioning kidneys.

While I do dialysis and transplants, and I'm an expert at that, those are treatments for failure. I would rather see someone not fail. But if you already have dialysis, you still need to have a wellness mindset.

LAS: Are you optimistic about the future of kidney care on a broad scale?

My optimism is great; otherwise, I wouldn't have been entrepreneurial about it.

The reason is twofold—because one of the things that we do is try to manage disease in a vacuum. Doctors didn't like business, businesspeople didn't understand the clinical, but now with managed care, we almost have to work together to do this.

What I don't want to see is more and more people needing renal care, and the government starts cutting services because they're so costly. If you put doctors, patients, and the doctorpatient relationship back in the driver's seat, it absolutely can work. We can manage chronic disease very well in this country.

The problem with the kidney disease patient is that the physiology is totally different when you get to those late stages of kidney disease. Now that we have a better genetic understanding, particularly in the Black community, of what's going on, there are now going to be drugs that are specific to stopping APO L1-mediated disease, which will be huge in the African American community.

So, we have to have people who push that science...and show the health plans that they can make money, show the doctors they can make more money, show the health system that it can save money, and show patients that they can live longer and better lives if they adhere to what we've created. The primary doctor for a dialysis patient needs to be the nephrologist and that's what K.Care IPA is about.

Rodney Potts Dramatizes From Creation to Christ with 'Genesis'



Although Klugh acknowledges that there's a lot of work to do, it's important to acknowledge the work that has been done. Being appointed principal at a school whose values she aligns with was certainly an honor and that honor is a boomerang.

Klugh has greatly contributed to the school not only by being a strong and compassionate leader for all students, but also by intentionally serving and representing a population that, in multiple facets of daily life, often goes underserved and underrepresented.

Her favorite part of it all? "The students. Being able to talk with them, when they come into my office just to say hi—it just makes

me so happy."

She understands that school is a place where children spend the majority of their formative years, and it is her intention to continue bringing home here. Klug said, "I think of a principal kind of as a tree, and all the branches are







Artist Arthur Haywood Wins the Writers and Illustrators of the Future Award

Arthur Haywood is a young, talented artist from Philadelphia, Pennsylvania. On Thursday, April 25, Haywood was honored at the Taglyan Complex in Hollywood as the winner of the Writers and Illustrators of the Future contest. His art will be published in the L. Ron Hubbard Presents Writers of the Future Volume 40, which was created by Illustrators of the Future Judge, Daniel dos Santos.

The contest is in its 41st year and is the most prestigious, longest running competition of its kind. Haywood has been creating exceptional artwork since he was a teenager, and has now evolved into a connoisseur of many art expressions.

Haywood earned a B.F.A. in Illustration from The Maryland Institute College of Art, before furthering his study of classical art at Cambridge Street Studios

Creating fantasy murals and illustrations to inspire others in reading is his pascreate book covers, paintings, and murals for libraries and schools, to engage youth in reading and art expression

Early in his career, Haywood starred on a trading spaces television show with his neighbor, which resulted in him receiving resources for a graffiti class at a Philadelphia community center. There he was exposed to public art and realized how art in public spaces could encourage and inspire the community. Haywood uses science-fiction and fantasy to engage and empower youth, while highlighting how limitless art expression can be.

His murals have garnered a lot of attention and through his talent he received an art residency that allowed him to travel to Paris, where he developed murals with students at Lycée Paul Lapie, Ecollectif, and André Malraux Elementary school, depicting students of diverse origins reading to encourage learning and cultural appreciation. Haywood believes one should embrace what is appealing to their eyes when looking to connect to literature through art. Staying inspired is the only way to grow and Haywood credits artists from the 19th century, the art he sees online and in museums, for keeping him focused on his passion. Realism with exaggerated colors and figures is the overall theme of most of his work, allowing a story to be told upon first glance.

L. Ron Hubbard founded the Writers of the Future contest in 1983, and due to its success, the Illustrators of the Future contest was initiated five years later. Hubbard's estate continues to fund the international Writers and Illustrators of the Future contests in perpetuity. Haywood was featured in the "Tulsa Black Wall Street Times," and is a recipient of the 2020-2021 Harriet Hale Woolley Scholarship at the Founda-

Following the 1982 release of his internationally acclaimed bestselling science fiction novel, "Battlefield Earth," Hubbard created the Writers of the Future in 1983 to provide a means for aspiring writers of speculative fiction to get that much-needed break. Due to the success of the Writers of the Future Contest, the companion Illustrators of the Future Contest was inaugurated in 1988.

In the 39 years of the Writers of the Future Contest, there have been 547 winners and published finalists. The past winners of the Writing Contest have published 2,000 novels and nearly 6,300 short stories. They have produced 36 New York Times bestsellers and their works have sold over 60 million copies.

In the 34 years of the Illustrators of the Future Contest, there have been 394 winners. The past winners of the Illustrating Contest have produced over 6.800 illustrations, 390

Future Award has now become the largest, most successful, and demonstrably most influential vehicle for budding creative talent in the world of speculative fiction. Since its inception, the Writers and Illustrators of the Future contests has produced 39 anthology volumes and awarded upwards of \$1 million in cash prizes and royalties.

Haywood connects with positive imagery that inspires and encourages expression. He believes "a word is worth a thousand pictures," and wants young artists to spend healthy amounts of time perfecting their skills, connecting those skills to a message that is important to them, and finding a community for support and resources. As art is a forever changing. Havwood has dedicated his life's work to creating art and supporting young artist throughout the world.

'Unseen Innocence:' Did a Black Man Kill Actor Sal Mineo?

"Unseen Innocence" is a documentary seeking to shed light on the tragic plight of Lionel "Ray Ray" Williams, a Black man who served time for the 1976 murder of actor Sal Mineo.

Williams says although he does have a criminal past, he is innocent of the crime, and he hopes the documentary will help to prove that.

Directed by filmmaker Letitia McIntosh, the documentary premieres Sunday, May 19, at the Cinemark Theater in Baldwin Hills.

The screening will be hosted by this writer, Los Angeles Sentinel Newspaper contributing writer and host of the KBLA Talk 1580 entertainment radio talk show "Black in the Green Room."

An additional Southern California screening will be held Wednesday, May 22, at the Historic Fox Theater in Bakersfield, with the documentary's narrator and host, actor Omar Gooding.

Mineo was born Salvatore Mineo Jr., and he was popularly known for the

classic films "Rebel Without a Cause," "Exodus," and "Escape From the Planet of the Apes."

In 1972, Mineo came

out as bisexual. McIntosh says she was initially led to Williams' story when she learned eyewitnesses of Mineo's murder said they saw a white man with blonde hair blowing in the air as he was flee-

ing the scene. "There's no way this is right," said McIntosh. "I researched it a little bit more, and I really dug deep, then started to find more and more."

Finally, McIntosh says after discovering more revealing evidence, she invited Williams to Detroit to discuss telling his side of the story in film.

The pair both remember being introduced by phone through a mutual friend from Williams' bike club the Sunset Riders.

"The conversation between us was real, educational – all the stuff she learned about the case I didn't know," said Williams. "We're still learning stuff about this case."

Williams says McIntosh revealed to him that there was a seventeen-year-old male witness who was never brought into court, and prosecutors were keeping the witness hidden until the case

However, McIntosh says the witness did testify before the grand jury.

was concluded.

According to Williams, based on new information presented to him by McIntosh, there was another key witness, a nine-year-old girl at the time, who says she saw a White man, 5'9" to 6'

with blonde hair kill Mineo. Both McIntosh and Williams contend they unfortunately cannot locate her today.

"I'm hoping that when this [information] comes out, they'll [legal officials] knock on the door and say, 'Look, I have the other side of the story," said Williams.

McIntosh says Williams had in his possession, for 48 years, the information he needed to be exonerated, such as the court documents which were included in his inmate records.

Williams says he never knew Mineo and the only connection authorities could make between the two men was a yellow car.

"The chief of police, Peter J. Pitchess at that time, put out a statement and gave the whole case over the TV," said Williams. "He gave every aspect - everything that he wasn't supposed to say, he said it."

He continued, "They made an announcement saying, 'If anyone loaned anyone a small yellow car, please contact the Hollywood sheriff's depart-

ment." Williams says he did borrow a yellow Dodge from O'Connor Lincoln, and the car was borrowed from the dealership while they were working on a vehicle he purchased from


them. The dealership in return, Williams continues, then called the sheriff's department notifying them that they had loaned Williams a car fitting that description.

"Six-months later, I was being extradited to Michigan on some check charges, forgeries," said Williams. "They [the authorities] came and visited me [in] Michigan and asked me about the yellow car. I said the car was no good and I had it brought back to O'Connor Lincoln."

He says the car was returned to the dealership by a Caucasian friend, however he does not believe that friend was the mysterious blonde suspect in question.

McIntosh concurs. "They kept asking me if I had a white friend - their main thing was who did I

to," said Williams. "I told them if you check the records, you can tell that the car was returned back to the lot within a couple of hours."

"One of the things that stood out about the car, and we can show it [from the court documents], is that the witness said the car was a Toyota, but [Williams] had rented a Dodge Colt," interjected McIntosh.

She says when the rental agreement was presented in court, it said that the yellow car Williams rented was

indeed a Dodge. McIntosh believes, from her reading of the court documents, prosecutors were trying to convince the eyewitnesses the car was a Dodge instead of a Toyota.

She says one of the witnesses was sure it was a Toyota because his brother had a blue version of the automobile.

"And those are the words that are in the documentation that Lionel "Ray Ray" Williams has in his possession," said McIntosh.

A state-of-the-art sports facility broke ground on May 8 that aspires to provide more athletic access to underserved communities. The facility will be called Lulu's Place, located near LAX and St. Bernard high

"When I think about L.A., all our young people deserve access to enriching sports programs and educational opportunities," said Los Angeles Mayor Karen

Bass. "The city is very proud to be a partner in supporting the development of Lulu's Place, bringing new life into this site that will serve our local communities."

Investment banker Doug Kimmelman spearheaded the effort, naming the facility after his late wife Carol "Lulu" Kimmelman. Lulu was a member of the USC Women of Troy tennis team that won the 1983 National Championship. She then became a third-grade teacher at Raymond Avenue Elementary School in South Los Angeles. Her family wanted to celebrate her fervor for helping underserved communities.

"Her passion was Los Angeles, that's where she was from, went to school in Riverside Poly," Kimmelman said. "She loved L.A., she loved those kids and those kids, they were underserved ... and she loved leading a healthy, active lifestyle."

Lulu's place will house

several athletic facilities, including 24 tennis courts, one full-sized soccer field, four basketball courts, one

sand volleyball court, and a wellness and fitness zone.

The groundbreaking was a long time coming; the Kimmelman family had been working for seven years to find the land and means to create Lulu's Place. Los Angeles County Supervisor Holly Mitchell had a special connection with the project as she was classmates with Lulu at Riverside Poly.

"This was to honor his bride ... [Kimmelman] has combined her passions: tennis, education and making sure kids who don't typically have access have access," Mitchell said. "That's why the location was key, the partnerships are key."

Private donors raised \$150 million for the center that will provide athletic

and academic enrichment to students throughout the Los Angeles area. The Kimmelman family worked with

LAUSD to get a gauge of

the support services that students in the area need.

St. Bernard will house the TGR Learning Lab which will use education to empower youth to follow their dreams and provide professional development to educators. After visiting the campus, Kimmelman donated \$5 million to Westchester High School to renovate their softball and baseball field.

"We are so excited students, particularly our student athletes to be able to come to a facility like this where they can engage academically and athletically," said Westchester principal Terri Grinner. "We're so thankful we got a \$5 million donation from [Kimmelman] and his family and Lulu's place."

Los Angeles County, LAUSD, and LAWA worked to bring Lulu's Place to fruition. Organizations that donated include USTA, the TGR Foundation, the Walt Disney Company, Cedars-Sinai, and Jersey Mike's.

The WardBoy Project works to empower youth in the Bay Area by hosting events that promote academic success, wellness, and mentorship.

"To accomplish what I set forth to do in my professional career is definitely rewarding," Ward said. "To be able to do it with my brother and give back to the community that we

come from, it definitely is very rewarding."

Several NFL stars will attend Champions in the Green, including Super Bowl champions Aqib Talib and Von Miller, Eddie Pleasant, Orson Charles, and Kayvon Webster. The entertainers that will be at the tournament include rapper PLO, influencer Mikaela Banks and actor Donovan Carter.

"We provide opportunies, programs and knowledge to these kids that are literally going to be in positions to give to those behind them sooner than later," Ward said. "We want to continue the cycle of giving back to the future,

After retiring from the NFL, Ward took up golfing. He mentioned how the two sports have several similarities.

Maggie Steffens asked for more support for the U.S. women's water polo team, and the captain received one particularly surprising response.

Instagram post, Flavor Flav has stepped forward to help the U.S. team as it goes for an unprecedented fourth consecutive gold medal at the Paris Olympics this summer. He is finalizing a deal that will make him a USA Water Polo sponsor and the official hype man for a program seeking a bigger spotlight.

The 65-year-old Flav, a founding member and hype man with Public Enemy, has jumped headfirst into his new duties, highlighting some of the team's best players on social media. He also is making plans to watch the women's team play in Paris.

> "When I come out and I watch this water polo team ... 'USA! USA!' Yo, I'm going to be the biggest hype man that they ever had in their life," he told the AP on Friday. "I'm going to be bigger than any cheerleader that they had in their life. I'm going to cheer this team on, and I'm going to cheer this team into winning a gold medal."

Winning has been the usual result for the U.S. women's team since the 2012 Olympics. But it hasn't attracted the same attention or support as similarly

dominant American programs, largely because water polo remains a niche sport throughout most of the

That — along with a little nostalgia — prompted Steffens, 30, the last remaining member of the 2012 team, to post on Instagram. While expressing gratitude for the opportunity to play and her love for her

sport, she also encouraged anyone reading the post to check out her team and highlighted the constant financial struggle for most Olympic athletes.

"We've gotten a lot of comments you know of 'Oh, it's so cool what you've done. Bummer you're not a soccer player or a basketball player, because your team would be getting way more publicity or way more support," Steffens said Friday from Paris, where the team is on a training trip ahead of the Olympics.

"And instead we're still kind of where we were at 12 years ago, which for me isn't my goal. I've always wanted to propel the sport forward.

Enter Flav, who was inducted with the group Public Enemy into the Rock and Roll Hall of Fame in 2013. Flav's man-

Steffens said it was "very surreal" when Flav whose legal name is William Jonathan Drayton Jr. — reached out. Asked what she knew about Flav and Public Enemy before the connection, Steffens


