U.S. Senator Alex Padilla – A Lifetime of Serving Communities Of Color & Fighting for Those Left Out of the American Dream

Alex Padilla is not your ordinary U.S. Senator. He has a degree in mechanical engineering from MIT -Massachusetts Institute of Technology, and easily could have parlayed that degree to pursue personal accolades and a life of leisure and personal wealth.

But, the first time U.S. Senator did not choose the simple path. Instead, he decided that a life of service to those who grew up like he did, unprivileged in a working class family, and that commitment to service has ascended him to one of the highest seats in California and throughout the nation.

As voters begin mailing in their ballots, they will find Padilla's name on their ballot twice. Once to complete the term of now Vice President Kamala Harris, who stepped down to become America's



first female vice president and first vice president of color, and once to serve the six-year full term as California's United States Senator.

Padilla is driven by memories of a segregated California, memories that still have a deep influence over the man who now represents the country's most populous state. Padilla took office on January 20, 2021 (Inauguration Day). He is California's first U.S. Senator of Mexican decent and in a time when America is wrestling with being a country where people of color are the majority, he is a voice for and of the people.

Post-Donald Trump, Padilla finds himself in the uncommon position of being one of the few voices of the masses in what is still a majority

U.S. Rep. Karen Bass held a press conference at Crenshaw High School in South Los Angeles on May 20, to highlight the damage that corporate tobacco companies have done to Black neighborhoods decades of targeting them with menthol cigarettes.

Surrounded faith leaders, education officials, parents and

students, Bass led the call for Californians to vote yes on a November ballot measure that would protect children by ending the sale of candy-flavored nicotine, including mintymenthol cigarettes. The event was sponsored by Black Leaders Against Tobacco Injustice, YES to Protect California Kids.

Charles Drew University and CommonSpirit Health Unite to Diversify Nursing Workforce

Partnership will help historically Black medical school expand capacity to train more nurses

Charles R. Drew University of Medicine and Science (CDU), one of the nation's four historically Black medical schools, and Common-Spirit Health, one of the nation's largest nonprofit health systems, parent company of Dignity Health California Hospital in Los Angeles, are responding to the national nursing shortage through a new partnership that will grow and diversify the nursing workforce.

"Even prior to the COVID-19 pandemic, we predicted a nursing shortage due to the retiring nursing workforce and the care needs of our aging population," said Kathy Sanford, D.B.A., R.N., chief nursing officer at CommonSpirit.

"Nursing schools simply don't have the capacity to train nurses fast enough to replace those leaving the profession. As one of the nation's largest employers

of nurses, we knew we Black and other underrepreneeded to be part of the solution."

Charles Drew University is expanding its curriculum to attract more students of color to the field of nursing.

A 2021 American Association of Colleges of Nursing study found that, although interest in nursing programs is strong, 80,521 qualified applications were not accepted at schools of nursing due primarily to a shortage of clinical sites, faculty, and resource constraints. The partnership will expand access to quality education and training by adding faculty and resources that help CDU, one of the nation's leading educators of

"In addition to clinical excellence, our students are focused on social justice and health equity for underserved populations in our surrounding communities in South Los Angeles and around the world who are affected by health disparities," said David M. Carlisle, M.D., Ph.D., president and chief executive officer at CDU.

"Expanding our program helps increase their impact and the likelihood

Studies show that having access to a provider with shared lived experience helps improve trust and outcomes, yet only 22.2% of Black adults reported being of the same race as their health care provider compared to 73.8%

of White adults. "In our Southern California Division alone, we employ 10,000 nurses that care for over a million people every year," said Julie J. Sprengel, president and CEO of CommonSpirit's Southern California Division.

"Together with Charles R. Drew, we're helping to remove systemic barriers and create a more diverse and dynamic workforce that reflects the communities we serve."

In addition to expanding capacity at CDU, the partnership seeks to drive early interest in nursing careers among students from underresourced or underrepresented groups. CommonSpirit and CDU will establish mentorship programs for diverse high school students and build relationships with pre-college educators and guidance counselors to help ensure that students know their options and the prerequisite coursework necessary for a career in nursing.

"As one of the nation's leading providers of Medicaid services, this partnership is an extension of CommonSpirit's larger commitment to increasing culturally competent health care providers," said Sprengel.

CommonSpirit expanding access to careers in health care through its academic partnerships with Baylor College of Medicine, Creighton University, and the Morehouse School of Medicine. Together with the Morehouse School of Medicine, CommonSpirit has launched the More in Common Alliance, a 10-year, \$100 million initiative to help address the lack of representation among health care providers.

In addition to growing medical education programs, CommonSpirit has established scholarships to help remove barriers to pursuing a career in health care, including a program at Creighton University that will provide 100 full-tuition scholarships to underrepresented students of color and \$3 million awarded to diverse health care professionals through the CommonSpirit Equity Impact Scholarship.

Melvin, who will celebrate his 10th anniversary as CBTU president, said, "Black workers, Black communities, Black women, Black youth, Black seniors, Black incarcerated men and women are under siege from all directions.

"Our very humanity is in peril - stoked by anti-Black racism and by the monstrous Big Lie of a stolen presidential election. We must come together now - in this embattled landscape to affirm our beautiful humanity and to lead the way out of these dark, dark days. True, our plate is full,

but we come to L.A. ready to

Melvin, who is also secretary-treasurer of the New York AFL-CIO, said the run-up to the midterm elections would be front and center. "Everything is on the ballot in November," he declared.

'Voting rights, civil rights, women's reproductive freedom, control of Congress and statehouses across the country. The January 6th insurrection showed the world that the Radical

Right has decided to take down democracy in order to hold onto power by any means necessary.

"CBTU will lead Black trade unionists toward developing an aggressive voter turnout strategy with our allies to counter this dangerous and reactionary power grab. Our message to ambivalent voters will be blunt: if they win, they get more power to do more harm to more Black and brown people and to the nation. It can get worse and it will get

worse, if we don't show up in November."


A cross-current of positive and negative labor trends underpin this year's CBTU convention. Yet, according to federal labor statistics Black union numbers are at a record low, falling by 50,000 since 2019. Less than 2 million Black workers are in unions now (1.9 million). As a result, the Black union rate dipped to 11.5 percent in 2021.



Healthy Families Coalition Demands Action to Protect Kids From Lead Poisoning

Community leaders, teachers and parents recently launched the Healthy Families Coalition to demand the Los Angeles City Planning and Environmental Health Departments immediately condemn Atlas Metals in Watts.

"For years the City of Los Angeles has ignored the pleas of a community that has been poisoned by lead and endangered by metal projectiles," said Tim Watkins, president and CEO of Watts Labor Community Action Committee (WLCAC).

"What's the point of having regulations on the books if the city isn't going to use them to protect nearly 1.000 kids?"

onto school grounds, threatening to injure or kill a student or staff member. One "narrowly miss[ed]" hitting a construction worker. To protect the kids at the school

shrapnel (photos) have been the Los Angeles Unified School District (LAUSD) closed a brand new softball field and the adjacent batting cages after spending \$3 million to remediate the environmental hazards and renovate the field.

> "This is one of the most egregious environmental injustices I've ever seen," said Ingrid Rivera- Guzman, president of the Latino Coalition of Los Angeles. "The dangers that these

> kids are exposed to would never be allowed in Beverly Hills in a million years, but for some reason, the city has looked the other way while Brown and Black kids have been poisoned for decades. This is unacceptable, and it's an injustice that must be stopped immediately."

> In a report from the Department of Toxic Substances Control (DTSC), a

showed that Atlas is in violation of Health and Safety Code section 25189.5 and companion sections regarding the Illegal Disposal of Hazardous Waste: Storage of Hazardous Waste; and Treatment of Hazardous Waste-violations which can be charged as felonies or misdemeanors under California state law.

"These kids go to school every day and endure shaking from a large magnetic compactor used to smash cars and other large objects, all of which severely disturbs the learning environment for high-schoolers that are already in a historically disadvantaged community." said Alan Antonio, an organizer with the non-profit, It's Our Turn. "City leaders have sat on their hands while these kids go to school

summary of violations every day in a dangerous environment. It's shameful."

> Court records indicate that the noise from the compactor (video) along with other fascinatingly loud noises cause children to "cup their ears" while at school. Staff at the school report "the violent slamming and crushing of metals...metallic dust on the blacktop and playing fields...large and dangerous pieces of metal... [and] incredibly loud explosions that sound like bombs..."

> In one case, an actual bomb was exploded at the site, projecting shrapnel onto school grounds. To block shrapnel from being onto ejected school grounds Atlas erected an unpermitted, illegal wall made from shipping containers that is unstable and leaning. A Supervising

Structural Engineer for LAUSD recently said in a declaration that:

"The Container Wall poses a clear and present danger to the students and staff at the School... In my opinion, there is a real potential danger that this wall of stacked shipping containers is likely to tip and fall, and because of the wall's height and immediate proximity to the School, such a collapse could be catastrophic with potential serious injuries or death to occupants of the School. I am particularly concerned about electrical poles and high voltage wires in the potential pathway of the wall if it were to collapse."

MAYOR GARCETTI OPENS TWO HHH PERMANENT SUPPORTIVE HOUSING COMPLEXES

The two projects will provide 80 units to Angelenos experiencing homelessness

Mayor Eric Garcetti this week celebrated the opening of two HHH-funded permanent supportive housing complexes — the HHH Rose Apartments and the PATH Villas Montclair, which together will provide housing and services to 80 Angelenos experiencing homelessness.


"These two openings represent the steady drumbeat of progress we promised to Angelenos when they said 'yes' to Prop HHH, and empowered us to surge ahead with comprehensive solutions to homelessness," said Mayor Eric Garcetti. "These ribbon-cuttings are a clear marker of how far we've come in our mission to welcome Angelenos into high-quality, permanent supportive units that can end the vicious cycle of homelessness and make real movement toward ending this crisis."

The PATH Villas Montclair in Crenshaw, which Mayor Garcetti opened earlier this week, consists of 45 studio apartments for formerly unhoused Angleneos. The Rose Apartments, which Mayor Garcetti opened today in Venice, contains 35 units. Both developments were funded through a variety of sources, including Measure HHH, and offer on-site supportive services, including individual case management, community building activities, and career development pro-

Since taking office, Mayor Garcetti has acted with unprecedented urgency to confront the homelessness and housing crisis from expanding the homelessness budget to over 20 times what it was eight years ago, to launching the A Bridge Home shelter program, which has served over 5,500 distinct residents while HHH-funded projects are built.

In Mayor Garcetti's latest budget, he proposed a \$1.164 billion commitment to homelessness solutions, the largest proposed investment by nearly \$200 million. The proposal includes a total of over 3,700 permanent supportive housing units, \$331 million for over 2,200 total housing units through Proposition HHH, and \$255 million for a new round of Project Homekey, which will add 928 permanent housing units.

Since Mayor Garcetti led the coalition to pass Proposition HHH in 2016, 51 permanent supportive and affordable housing projects with more than 3,100 apartments have come online, including 25 Proposition HHH projects with

over 1,500 units. 74 permanent supportive and affordable housing units with more than 4,700 apartments are currently under construction, with 19 projects breaking ground this year.

In a rousing speech during the charity event, Martin revealed that SNN will open L.A.'s first-ever comprehensive medical and developmental center -- the Center for Autism and Developmental Disabilities (C.A.A.D) -- in the late fall of 2022. The state-of-theart autism center on the campus of the Martin Luther King Jr. Community Hospital will serve thousands of families in the Watts/Willowbrook neighborhoods and surrounding areas each month.

Martin also revealed SNN's new initiative,

called the Special Needs Network Think Institute for Research and Economic Advancement. The Think Institute will be the region's first think tank and research institute, located in South Los Angeles, focused solely on dismantling systemic racism in health and autism care.

Through collaborative partnerships with local colleges, national thought leaders and clinicians, the Think Institute will create anti-racist and inclusive service delivery models for individuals of color with autism and other special needs as well as address issues of homelessness, employment and entrepreneurship for BIPOC individuals with special needs.

Reparations Task Force's Anchor Orgs Are Holding Public 'Listening Sessions'

The Coalition for A Just and Equitable California (CJEC), a reparations advocacy group, is inviting residents of Northern California to attend a "Listening Session" to discuss reparations.

The meeting will be held in Oakland on Saturday, May 28, from 1 p.m. to 4 p.m.

With the support of the California Task Force to Study and Develop Reparations Proposals for African Americans and the state's Department of Justice (DOJ), the event, open to the public, will be held at the California Ballroom, located at 1736 Franklin Street.

"This is one of two, free official-sponsored listening sessions that the task force has asked us to do," said Chris Lodgson, an Elk Grove resident and CJEC member. "This will definitely help us get an accurate account (of the harms) done to Black people in this state."

CJEC is a state-wide coalition of organizations, associations, and community members united for reparations for the descendants of enslaved Black American men and women.

The Oakland meeting is one of a series of listening sessions that will be hosted by Reparations task force anchor organizations across the state. Seven "anchor organizations" across the state have been selected to partner and host the gatherings in conjunction with the task force.

The listening sessions are designed to ensure certain communities in the state provide their thoughts and

concerns about the work the Reconstruction migration of task force is doing. Reconstruction migration of formerly enslaved people to

Each organization will help the task force evaluate California's role in slavery and Jim Crow discrimination – and follow that work Reconstruction migration of formerly enslaved people to that state's Indian Territory to contemporary efforts to rebuild Black prosperity.

up with developing resolutions to compensate African Americans for past and ongoing race-based injustices

Task force members expected to attend the Oakland session are Dr. Jovan Scott Lewis, chair of the Department of Geography at the University of California Berkeley; and vice-chair Dr. Amos Brown, a civil rights leader and respected Bay Area pastor whose journey to leadership started under the tutelage of Dr. Martin Luther King Jr. in the 1960s.

Lewis has just published the book, "Violent Utopia: Dispossession and Black Restoration in Tulsa." Lewis, a Jamaican-born scholar, retells details of the 1921 Tulsa race massacre and paints a picture of its aftermath. His book traces the history of Black Oklahomans from the post-

Tulsa's Greenwood neighborhood, colloquially known as "Black Wall Street," diminished the spirit of freedom and derailed progress African Americans had begun to make.

Scott told Los Angelesbased Politics in Black, a podcast hosted by reparations advocates Chad Brown and Friday Jones, that his purpose is to listen to the residents of Oakland and supply them with background information about the Task Force.

The Task Force will submit its first report to the California legislature in June. The 13-chapter document will detail the committee's findings thus far and include recommendations related to them.

"It's important to know that these are preliminary recommendations. The actual work of coming up with reparations recommendations is what we're going to be doing for all the issues (for the final report in 2023)," Scott told Brown and Jones. "I am really looking forward to having the conversations that we will have over the next several months around compensation. Reparations are compensation, and from day one, my position has been cash-based reparations."

Gov. Gavin Newsom signed Assembly Bill (AB) 3121 into law in 2020. California Secretary of State Shirley Weber authored the legislation establishing the task force when she was a member of the State Legislature. The committee is charged with studying slavery and its lingering effects on African Americans with a 'special consideration" for descendants of persons enslaved in the United States. the bill language instructs.

AB 3121 also requires members to recommend what compensation should be, who should receive it, and how it should be paid. A panel of economists contracted by the task force will

provide their perspective on the financial aspects of compensation and its impacts.

"These listening sessions are important and probably the center, the core part, of the task force's community engagement process," Lodgson said. "This is one of the more important ways that the community can learn about reparations in California. This is the way to get the word out to the people from seven organizations."

prepared to recruit and amplify the voice of Black workers at the national, state and local level."


CBTU President Emeritus William "Bill" Lucy will take his first train ride to a CBTU convention.

Strong Support, Harsh Criticisms Follow Gov. Newsom's Budget Into Final Negotiations

On May 13, Gov. Gavin Newsom held a press conference in Sacramento to present his \$300.6 billion revised budget for fiscal year 2022-23. He has dubbed the spending plan the California Blueprint. It is the largest budget proposal in the 172year history of the state.

During the briefing, Newsom also announced that the state is expected to have a whopping budget surplus that will increase to \$97.5 billion by the summer of 2023.

"Simply without precedent no other state in American history has ever experienced a surplus as large as this," said Newsom.

"Backed by a robust surplus and grounded in our unshakable values, we're paving the California way forward to prosperity and progress for all," Newsom continued, summarizing his spending plan.

"With historic investments, we're doubling down on our formula for success and making sure no one is left behind – supporting working families and businesses, tackling climate change, expanding health care access, making our communities safer, and more," he said.

Newsom's budget includes increased investments to the tune of hundreds of billions of dollars in education (at all levels), housing, the private sector, clean energy, agriculture, reproductive health, public safety, and more.

The Governor said as

California makes investments and builds programs, its spending must reflect its values.

"California values make us competitive globally," said Newsom. "There is a reason California's economy outperforms every other economy in the Western Hemisphere – 7.8 % GDP growth just in the last year."

Assemblymember Chris Holden (D-Pasadena), a member of the California Legislative Black Caucus and chair of the Assembly Committee on Appropriations, praised the Governor's spending plan.

"I commend the Governor for conveying the message through programs, healthcare, and pay equity that California will continue to thrive," Holden said. "The proposal sets strong precedent for those still struggling through the disparate impact of the pandemic and ensures that California continues to keep the environment top of mind."

Reacting to the governor's budget announcement, Republican leadership in the California Assembly criticized the Governor's proposal, calling it "ineffective."

"The Governor may not want to acknowledge it, but California is in crisis," read the statement authored by Assembly Republican Leader James Gallagher (R-Yuba City), Assemblymember Vince Fong (R- Bakersfield), Vice Chair of the Assembly Budget Committee.

"Everyday Californians are being crushed by an affordability crisis worsened by 40-year high inflation," Gallagher and Fong's statement continued. "While the Governor makes flashy political headlines, he continues to fail to make investments that will help Californians endure these tough

"The most important thing on people's minds, understandably, is 'How do I lower costs?' High inflation. Record inflation," said Newsom. "What are we going to

California's second African American Superintendent of Public Instruction Tony Thurmond, said Newsom's plan to invest \$128.3 billion in education, "lifts up the most critical needs" of students and schools across the state.

"As we continue to recover from the COVID-19 pandemic, California public schools will see a muchneeded infusion of investments at a time when students and schools, especially those that have been traditionally underserved, require more support than ever before," Thurmond said.

Throughout his budget presentation, the Governor acknowledged the challenges Californians are facing because of rapid inflation.

do to ease that burden?"

"That's why we are proposing \$18.1 billion dollars to put back in the pockets of tens of millions of Californians," Newsom continued.

The governor's inflation relief plan includes \$11.5 billion in tax refunds; \$2.7 billion in emergency rental assistance; \$750 million for free public transit; \$933 million in stipends for hospital and nursing home staff; \$1.4 billion to help low-income families pay utility bills; \$304 million in middle class health care subsidies; \$439 million to offset a proposed diesel tax pause; \$157 million to cover fee waivers for childcare, among other investments.

Assemblymember James Ramos (D-Highland), the only Native American fentanyl crisis, retail theft, supporting mental health services and fighting to reduce the numbers of murdered and missing Indigenous people have also been the focus of my legislation since assuming office," Ramos said.

Three days after the Governor unveiled his budget proposal, California's non-partisan, independent Legislative Analyst's Office (LAO) warned that the state could face an economic downturn soon.

"Predicting precisely when the next recession will occur is not possible. However, certain economic indicators historically have offered warning signs that a recession is on the horizon. Many of these indicators currently suggest a heightened risk of a recession within two years," the LAO report stated.

Republican leaders criticized what they called the Governor's ineffective proposals on the rising price of gas, housing affordability and the critical water shortage the state is facing.

"Ignoring the people's financial burdens, the Governor refuses to provide immediate gas tax relief," said Gallagher and Wong in their joint statement. "He did not propose any permanent tax relief to deal with a worsening affordability crisis exacerbated by his policies. Given the bone-dry conditions caused by the third year of drought, he stubbornly dismisses the cry to build more water storage and accelerate wildfire prevention projects."

Under California state law, the Governor and Legislature must complete the budget negotiation process and approve the spending proposal for the next fiscal year by June 15. The Governor has until June 30 to sign it into law.

"This year's budget is unprecedented in some of the challenges that it presents, but the Assembly has been preparing for months to meet those challenges," said Assembly Speaker Anthony Rendon (D-Lakewood). "It is also reassuring to have the Senate and Pro Tem Toni Atkins as teammates for this budget process. We know how to work together to present Governor Gavin Newsom with a budget he can be proud to sign by the constitutional deadline."



White, majority maledominated Senate. And while the Democrats hold the slimmest of majorities in the Senate with Vice President Harris serving as the tie-breaking vote, current election season threatens to push the Democrats back into the minority where the unrelenting Republican Party could seize control of the Senate, and possibly even Congress.

Padilla was recently quoted in an article in the Atlantic that he wants "to ensure that the American dream my family has experienced in the San Fernando Valley is still within reach." The past four years have tested that dream for millions, especially Black and Brown Americans. But Padilla is hopeful that the Democratic Party will keep it alive?

Also in this position, he advocated and pushed through California's sameday voting registration law and allowed 16-and-17year-olds to preregister to vote online.

Padilla has not shied away from discourse or fights with his Latino/x counterparts, especially, Senators Marco Rubio of Florida and Ted Cruz of Texas. This was never more on display than when he first arrived in the U.S. Senate to impeach Donald Trump for provoking the January 6 Capitol insurrection, in stark contrast to his Latino counterparts, Cruz and

And he has not simply been a backer of the Latino agenda, but he has also been outspoken on issues that address the lack of representation within the Black community and other disenfranchised groups as well. He views the issues facing America regarding voter suppression as an attack upon us all.

Alex Padilla recently questioned a panel of voting rights experts in a Senate Committee Judiciary hearing examining the rise in attacks on voting rights throughout the nation. The panel included Sherrilyn Ifill, president and director-counsel of the NAACP Legal Defense and Educational Fund; Stacey Abrams, founder of Fair Fight Action; and Dr. Carol Anderson, Charles Howard Candler professor African American Studies and chair of African American Studies at Emory

University.

Padilla has outspoken about restoring and improving access to the ballot for the American people and about voter suppression tactics being rooted in White supremacy.

"Some Republican colleagues raised the frame of working to make it easier to vote, but harder to cheat...study after study report after report, investigation after investigation continues to document that voter fraud in America is exceedingly rare," stated Padilla during voter suppression hearings.

He further insisted, "During the Jim Crow we know racially targeted racially motivated suppression was

blatant. Legislators adapted overtly racist policies like literacy tests, and poll taxes in an effort to shape the electorate.

"Today's suppression playbook is still rooted in White supremacy, and motivated by the same factors as their Jim Crow predecessors, but looks different. Overtly racist policies have been replaced by facially neutral ones like mandated in-person voting requirements.

"The decommissioning of polling sites and manipulated discriminatory photo ID laws is as mentioned, but just because these new voter suppression tactics are facially neutral, it can be harder for people to recognize and understand their pernicious effects."

Padilla has proven himself throughout his political career to be a man of the people. A tireless fighter for the rights of the underserved, oppressed and a relentless advocate for communities of color, and has certainly earned the right to be re-elected as California's U.S. Senator.

Rarely, do we get an opportunity to actually vote for one candidate twice in one election, but in this election, Alex Padilla has the right to be voted for TWICE.

disease and death in Black communities.

"Coming from a medical and health background, I know the real and devastating impact smoking can have, especially if addiction starts early. It's not right that tobacco companies spend billions of dollars on advertisements and lobbyists and paid spokespeople in exchange for the right to target Black youth with deadly products like menthol cigarettes, and generate big profits from it," said Bass, who is also a candidate for mayor of Los Angeles.

"We will vote 'big tobacco' out of our neighborhoods - and out of California - in November by voting yes to protect the next generation from getting hooked on nicotine."

For generations, the tobacco industry has preyed how "big tobacco's" racism on Black Americans, who created a cycle of addiction, now die of heart disease, lung cancer, stroke, and tobacco-related diseases at rates far higher than Whites. The bipartisan overwhelmingly popular Senate Bill 793, passed in 2020, would have put tobacco companies on notice - ending the sale of candy-flavored nicotine products, including mintyflavored menthol cigarettes, statewide.

equal or greater number who have been harmed by violence," Blacknell said.

The special advisor of the district attorney office continued, "My lived experience is emblematic of the fact that the people who cause harm and the victims of violence are almost always from the same community. Often, they are the same person."

Blacknell is a USC graduate of Gould School of Law. She holds the position of special advisor to the D.A. and interim director of the Bureau of Victim Services.

Blair was raised in underserved communities by a stepfather who was frequently incarcerated. Currently, she is fully immersed in the county with the goal and making it a safer place for the future.

covered up video of a deputy with his knee on the neck of an inmate for months, and then retaliated against those who called him out on it.

"This is just one incident that was revealed due to a leaked video, but who knows how many more very disturbing issues have been covered up under this administration's lawless tenure," Rhambo said in a statement last month. "L.A. County deserves better."

For his part, if elected, he will work on mandatory reporting policies and call for immediate investigations into misconduct, he told the Sentinel last week. And, he said he believes that "community policing has to become a philosophy."

There are at least 18 active deputy gangs within the Los Angeles Sheriff's Department. The 1992

don't tell people we have a business that needs funding because we assume that we're not going to get it. The [Small Business Crawl] space took the edge off in regards to talking about finances."

The former branch manager added, "Oftentimes, when people come into a bank they feel intimidated as opposed to saying, 'I've worked hard and I'm going to go in and be positive and even if I don't get approved, maybe I'll leave here with some resources.' When we go in with a negative mindset and count ourselves out, that prevents us from making the necessary strides that we could make. City and Faith Leaders Host Solidarity Vigil Against Hate

City, community and faith leaders joined together to honor the lives lost to hate in a candlelight vigil hosted by the Civil + Human Rights and Equity Department (LA Civil Rights), and First AME Church on May 23.

The vigil, which included Mayor Eric Garcetti and other city leaders, comes after recent attacks in Buffalo, New York that killed ten people, all African-American, a shooting at a Taiwanese church in Laguna Woods, California that killed one and injured five others.

Tragedies continued on May 24, when 18 children and two adults were killed by an 18-year-old gunman who entered an at an elementary school in Uvalde, Texas.

"In Los Angeles, there is no room for hate and we denounce the plague of racism and violence that has taken so many lives,"

said Mayor Eric Garcetti. "We come together in sorrow and anger, but also with purpose — to commit to fighting back with the love and belonging that define our City of Angels."

"While our hearts are heavy in grief at the loss of the lives that were stolen from us in Buffalo and Laguna Woods, honoring each of the legacies they left behind is precisely how we even begin to combat prejudices and hate," said Councilmember Curren

"Our country has reached a crossroad, where tolerance is fleeting and skin tones are weaponized; we must not allow ignorance to flourish and we certainly cannot go back to where we once were. Our differences are, after all, what makes us great. United we will always stand."

"We stand together with sorrow and loss that we are holding vet another vigil. We need to recognize this for what it is - a crisis of hate," said Councilmember Paul Koretz.

"Vigils like these are happening far too often here in California and guns out of circulation and working to prevent those who are not legally allowed to possess them from having access to them."

across the country. Shootings and homicides have continued to surge since the onset of the COVID-19 pandemic, and Los Angeles has been no exception. With such staggering numbers and the sharp increase in hate crimes, this is vet another reason why I've been working for years to keep the most dangerous

"We are hosting this vigil to honor the lives lost to hate in Buffalo and to create space for people to grieve, heal, and find community across cultures and across faiths," said Capri Maddox, executive director of the L.A. Civil Rights department.

"These deadly attacks were not isolated incidents. Hate crimes and racially motivated violence against many communities is rising in the U.S., including right here in Los Angeles. We need to stand together and make it known that when they come for one of us, they come for all of us."

The candlelight vigil in

First A.M.E.'s chapel and parking lot included a reading of the names of those killed in recent hate-motivated attacks and a prayer led by different faith leaders. Attendees also included LAPD Chief Moore, leaders from the Christian, Catholic, Jewish, Muslim, Bahai and Episcopal faiths, African-American church leaders, as well as leaders from Asian American Advancing Justice-LA, Korean American Christian Coalition, and Women Against Gun Violence. The vigil provided a space for mourning, healing, and building solidarity against hate across cultures and

Hate-motivated attacks in the U.S. are at their highest level since 2001, and are continuing to rise both locally and nationally. Hate crimes increased statewide by 31% in 2020, driven primarily by a rise in anti-Black bias, according to the California Department of Justice. That same year, hate crimes in the City of Los Angeles also rose against Latinos, transgender individuals, and immigrants. Hate crimes against Asian Americans and Pacific Islanders in the city more than doubled.

Resources were also shared from the LA Civil Rights Department's LA for All campaign, an anti hate PSA campaign in 18 languages that shares resources to report hate crimes and hate incidents in the city. Multi-colored posters let people know that if they see or experience a hate crime or incident, they can report it to LAPD or by calling 311 or

City Council Passes Motion on Violence Against Black Women & Girls

The Los Angeles City Council unanimously passed a motion on May 24, seeking an equity analysis on violence facing Black women and girls, citing the disproportionate number missing and murdered of Black women and girls in the United States.

The motion, introduced by Councilmembers Curren Price and Marqueece Harris-Dawson, seeks an equity analysis from the Civil + Human Rights and Equity Department (LA Civil

Rights) and LAPD.

The motion was introduced in January of this year, following the brutal murder of Tioni Theus, a

16-year-old Black girl whose body was found alongside the Manchester Avenue onramp to the 110

Freeway. Her murder

remains unsolved.

"It's been 136 days since the lifeless body of Tioni Theus was left discarded on the side of the 110 Freeway, but for the Theus family it has been an eternal nightmare they will never wake up from," said Price. "I am pleased to see all of the collective forces in government standing united in the name of Tioni Theus and all of the other unnamed Black girls who have fallen victim to senseless acts of violence," Price added.

"All too often we don't see the cases of missing or

murdered Black women and girls publicized in mainstream media. This erasure reinforces the racist notion that the lives of Black women and girls are of lesser value—or don't matter in our society," said Harris-Dawson.

"This motion is an attempt to make other people quantify the stories and experiences we live. My hope is that once people understand the depth of this problem then we can start moving toward justice, including justice for Tioni Theus and her family."

The motion instructs the L.A. Civil Rights Department, led by Executive Director Capri Maddox, with the assistance of the LAPD, to publish an equity analysis on violence and crime facing Black women and girls in the City of Los Angeles, the rate at which homicides and violent crimes against them are solved, how missing persons cases involving Black women and girls are handled, and policy recommendations for providing equity and justice for these victims and their families.



Through Western Our Way (WOW), a project along Western Avenue between Martin Luther King Boulevard and Century Boulevard, traffic will slow down to mitigate car accidents along this high injury network.

The Manchester/Broadway project area spans seven blocks, east to west along Manchester Avenue and 33 blocks along South Broadway. It includes improvements to sidewalks, new bus benches and planters, upgrades to the medians, and street lighting.

In March, we broke ground on the Rail to River project, which runs 8.3 miles alongside Slauson. It will provide dedicated walking



in Before Basking in the Sun

With Memorial Day approaching, and many people looking forward to spending more time outdoors walking, biking, hiking, camping and swimming, we cannot forget an important fact: too much ultraviolet radiation exposure from the sun is hazardous to your health.

Indeed, it can cause skin cancer, a potentially deadly disease that afflicts approximately 9,500 people in the U.S. each day.

People of all ethnic groups are vulnerable to getting skin cancer, including people of color, many of whom wrongly think they are immune to skin cancer due to their dark skin. In addition, a 2016 study in the Journal of the American Academy of Dermatology noted that melanoma, a form of skin cancer that affects all ethnic groups, is more frequently detected in later stages in Black men and women than in any other ethnic group. This can lead to a worse skin cancer prognosis and higher mor-

tality rates. "It is true that people with black or brown skin may have more tolerance for direct sun light and are less likely to get skin cancer, but they are definitely


not immune," said Dr. Linda Tolbert, regional chief of dermatology at Kaiser Permanente Southern California, who is African American.

"Anyone can get skin cancer, so it's smart for all of us to protect our skin from UV radiation to lessen the risk, including people of color."

Skin cancer is the most common cancer in the United States, according to the American Academy of Dermatology. Current estimates are that one in five Americans will develop skin cancer in their lifetime.

Though people of color are less likely to become afflicted with skin cancer, they are much more likely to die from it due to delay in detection or presentation, according to the National Library of Medicine. Very often, skin cancer is diagnosed at a more advanced stage in people of color, making treatment more difficult.

One of the best ways for everyone to protect your skin when outdoors is using sunscreen with a sun protection factor (SPF) of 30 or higher, and it should be regularly reapplied. This includes every 1-2 hours when in the water or when sweating, Dr. Tolbert noted.

Additionally, there are other steps you should take to protect your skin. They include:

- Avoiding the sun during its peak hours from 10 a.m. to 4 p.m.
- Understanding that sand, water and snow can reflect 85% of the sun's
- Protecting your eyes by wearing sunglasses capable of blocking 99% of UVA and UVB radiation.
- Wearing loose-fitting, long-sleeved clothing to cover much of your skin whenever possible.
- · Wearing clothing with the UPF label that helps protect against UV radiation.
- Completely shielding the skin of babies younger than 6 months from the sun because their skin is more sensitive.

The Importance of Self-Examination

Dr. Tolbert encourages everyone to examine their skin periodically as early detection is critically important to successfully treating skin cancer.

"Look for new spots or growths on your skin that are changing," she said. "Look for spots that may be growing, itching or bleeding. That could be an early sign of skin cancer that can occur even in sun-protected places, like the soles of

our feet. If you detect any red flags, have your skin checked by a medical practitioner."

There are great free resources online regarding skin cancer and prevention, including videos and tips for self-exams, including at www.aad.org. Kaiser Permanente also offers tips on skin cancer prevention, as well as care instructions.

In December 2021, I interviewed Sam Lewis, the executive director of ARC, the Anti-Recidivism Coalition in DTLA, for a story I was doing for "Bonnie Boswell Reports" on preventing recidivism among women.

As I high school student and the poor within the

wanted to know how Sam became involved in ARC.

"By the time I was 18, I'd been shot twice, stabbed and my mother's house had been shot up," said Sam. "It was the 1980s, and L.A. was considered the gang capital of the country. I was a teenager, a high school dropout and had been sentenced to a life sentence in prison."

Sam continued. "I could I'd become aware of the barely read and write when disparity in the treatment of I got to prison, and when women, minorities, youth, I got there, I accepted my fate." But then something criminal justice system. I happened. One day, Sam's

seven-year old daughter came to visit him. This particular time, she saw him behind the plexiglass in

"I saw the fear in her eyes," he said. "My daughter had one request," he said, "Please don't get in trouble anymore so I can hug you. That shook me to my core," said Sam. "I vowed to become a changed man." And he did.





"Gethsemane Christian Love is more than just a fellowship," explained Smith. "It's a church that


offers spirituality as well as psychology to help the totality of a person to build healthy relationships, to build healthy families and to build a healthy life.

Words of the Week - Remember Your Faith

Scripture: II Timothy 1:5 (NLT)

Here, the Apostle Paul is sending a gentle, yet encouraging word and reminder to his "son in the faith," Timothy, to remember his faith. It's a personal letter from one who generally wrote epistles and it gives us a unique and private perspective of the feelings and insecurities that both men share.

They were close in their relationship – close in comradeship, close in ministry, close in their feelings about Christ! They had cried together when they parted – these two men were close.

Paul had circumcised Timothy so he would be more acceptable to his detractors – they were close! They had ministered together. Out of three "sons in the ministry," the closest to Paul was Timothy.

If anyone was to take over behind Paul – it was Timothy. Paul wanted him to visit, but Timothy did not want to go, even though they were close!

Timothy was ministering in Ephesus. Paul was writing from a damp, cold prison cell under Emperor

Nero in Rome. Paul was alone and lonely; his mind guarded and unguarded; his spirit stable and unstable; both fearful and confident in his outlook and intentions, but needed someone to visit who knew his story, knew his journey, and knew his aspirations, objectives, and fears.

Just then, Paul needed a trustworthy person who would not judge, but inspire, who would not see his desire as a weakness, but as a human being alone in a damp cold prison who longed for his "son in the ministry" to visit. Timothy did not go!

Have you ever been in a place and a time where you wanted someone to listen and be there for you and not judge? Have you ever been in a place where you needed someone close to you who knew your situation, was aware of your

circumstances; knew you were vulnerable, fearful, and doubtful?

That was the Apostle Paul - the one who wrote most of the books of the New Testament, one who was snake bitten, stoned, jailed, and left for dead for his convictions. He gave, but here he needed to receive, and Timothy did not want to go!

want to go!
Paul needed to vent, exhale, and have company just sit there with him, listen, and acknowledge his discomfort! But Timothy did not want to go!

I wonder if anybody here knows what it is like needing someone, wanting someone and they just don't want to go! You need a personal letter of encouragement; a hand on a shoulder, a pat on the back, a kick in the "you know what!"

You need a smile, a physical presence that somebody is listening and is aware you are going through something! Not for self-pity, but for self-healing.

Paul needs Timothy's strong, faithful presence and to be unafraid to take over, so he adds a little pressure. In verses 3-5, Paul says, "Timothy, I thank God for you and constantly remember you in my prayers. I long to see

you again for I remember your tears as we parted. I will be filled with joy when we are together again. I remember your genuine faith that first filled your grandmother, Lois, and mother, Eunice. And I know that same faith continues strong in you."

Timothy was a secondgeneration Christian, who was taught the Holy Scriptures (the Old Testament) at an early age and Paul reminds him in II Timothy 3:14, "But you must remain faithful to the things you have been taught. You know they are true, for you know you can trust those who taught you. You have been taught the Holy Scriptures from childhood, and they have given you the wisdom to receive the salvation that comes by trusting in Christ Jesus."

We learn early in life about fear and doubt. We learn much later about the intricacies of faith.

We learn of faith when events in life knock on our door. We grow into learning! Faith becomes our learned behavior:

We learn while struggling with ideologies of critical race theory, White replacement theory, and a mother's right to choose! We learn while attempting to understand racist perpetrators who would deliberately target, nonsuspecting human beings who were grocery shopping and minding their own business!

We learn after devilish gun attacks on children in schools and worshippers in the sanctuary of churches! We learn after attempted government takeovers, political uprisings, and stirred-up hate speech!

We learn how special it is to have mommas and grandmas, who though didn't know a lot – they knew how to pray, "Our Father who art in heaven hallowed be thy name..."

They knew how to say, "The Lord is my shepherd; I shall not want. He maketh me lie down in green pastures, He leads me beside still waters, and He restores my soul. He leads me in the paths of righteousness for His name's sake. Yea, though I walk..."

Thank you, Lord, for mommas and grandmommas who teach, "If God is for me, it doesn't matter who is against me!"

It made us smile – It picked us up, turned us around, and placed our feet

Thank you, Lord, for mommas and grandmothers who teach, "I can do all things through Christ which strengthens me." Thank you, Lord, for mommas and grandmothers who teach, "All things are possible with God!"

Thank you, Lord, for mothers and grandmothers who teach, "Momma may have, papa may have, but God bless the child that has his own." Remember your faith, Timothy! Remember your faith!

Through faith we can: "Seek ye first the kingdom of God and all else can be added unto us!"

Through faith we can: "Seek and you will find; ask and it will be given; knock and the door will be open." Through faith we can take comfort: "He sits high and looks low" and "never leaves the righteous forsaken or its seed begging for bread."

Through faith, we learn you can say, "Move mountain and it will be moved! Faith is the substance of things hoped for and the evidence of things unseen." Faith is power without limitations!

Keep your faith in the Father, faith in the Son, and faith in the Holy Spirit! Remember your faith. In Jesus' Name. Amen.


for as Haji Malcolm taught, "freedom is essential to life" and without freedom we can never satisfy our material needs, know our true selves or flourish and come into the fulness of



Also, the principle and practice of Ujamaa rejects capitalist, corporate and predatory appropriation of African lands and resources, supports debt cancellation, reparations and recovery of stolen cultural and economic treasures and the wealth being returned to the peoples of Africa.

The fifth principle of Nia (Purpose) tells us that with work and struggle of an African renaissance on the continent, but also throughout the world African community. fosters the vision and call of Nana Marcus Garvey who said he saw emerging from our self-conscious work and struggle "a new world of Black people, a notion of sturdy people making their impression of civilization and causing a new light to dawn on humanity."

The sixth principle Kuumba (Creativity) calls on us to do always as much as we can in the way we can in order to leave our community more beautiful and beneficial than we inherited it. And that community is our local, national and world community as well as the world as a whole.

As Nana Dr. Mary McLeod Bethune taught, our task is not simply to liberate ourselves, "Our task is to remake the world." We must, Kawaida teaches, think new thoughts and image new ways of being African and human and bring them into being.

Finally, the principle

us to believe in our people and in the righteousness and victory of our struggle. We constantly stress love of and belief in the masses of our people. Indeed, Nana Bethune taught "the measure of our progress as a race is in perceive relation to the depth of the faith in our people held by our leaders."

And Nana Garvey tells us that we must stay steadfast in the struggle, strong in faith, courage and commitment which he defines as "wholeness of belief overshadowing all suspicion, all doubt, admitting no question, to serve without regret or disgust, to oblige oneself to that which is promised and expected, to keep one's word and do our duty well and never say die and never give up."

Likewise, Nana Osagyefo Nkrumah tells us to have faith in and rely on the capacity of the masses for liberation. He says, "if for a whole the imperialists appear to be gaining ground, we must not be discouraged. For time is on our side."

He assures us that it is the righteous and relentless resistance of the masses that "is the deciding factor and no power on earth can prevent its ultimate decisive effect in the revolutionary struggle" to bring into being a new world and history of humankind.



degree in Education. Jim later earned his MBA from Pepperdine University. In 2006 he was inducted into the Chapman University Athletic Hall of Fame.







Derf was born Frederick George Walker on January 11, 1947 to Vincent and Nora Moorer-Walker. He knew from a very early age that "The Woodbine Twine," a dance that quickly gained popularity and showcased another layer of his creativity, but music would still be his first love. After seeing Ben Ali and the Africa Boys perform, Derf got his first taste of West African music, and by the time he turned 20, he formed his first band, "The Black Spirits."

The Black Spirits played for activists Dick Gregory and Jesse Jackson, and famed poet Sonia Sanchez. Jazz musician Phil Cohran asked Derf to join his tribe of creatives at the AFFRO-ARTS theater in Chicago and it wasn't long before he became a member of Phil's Artistic Heritage Ensemble.

The Artistic Heritage Ensemble evolved into Pharaohs. Pharaohs' debut album, "The Awakening," infused with jazz and funk. It was released in 1971 on vinyl and lives on digital streaming today.

Having mastered the flute and percussions, Derf was sought out by countless artists such as Jerry Butler, Freda Payne, Barry White, Lionel Hampton, Donny Hathaway, Etta James, The Ohio Players, The Chi-Lites, Natalie Cole, and Della Reese to lend his incredible musical artistry in studio and live jam sessions. He was a prominent member of Ramsey Lewis's band before moving to Los Angeles in

While in Los Angeles, Derf's musical endeavors continued to soar. performed throughout Europe with jazz musician Eddie Harris. He toured around Canada with rock musician Burton Cummings. His command of his craft took him to South Africa's Joy of Jazz Festival playing alongside jazz singer Dwight Trible.

own DaCuzmo, was a regular on the L.A. scene, firing up the stages at Barbara Morrison, The World Stage, Kaos Network, Temple Bar, The Mint and countless venues around the city and the country.




